Jubilee Celebration: "This is God's Work"

W hat a year for 50th anniversary celebrations! They have been numerous, world-wide, and as varied as the cultures of the 35 countries where L'Arche communities are present.

The 37 communities in France gathered at Paray-le-Monial May 1-3, with 2,000 people kicking off the Jubilee year celebrations. In Winnipeg, we hosted an art show in August and held a Jubilee social in October. Two members of our community attended a Jubilee celebration in Trois-Rivières, Québec in September, and two others attended a national celebration in Ottawa in November (see page 3).

The largest celebration of all took place recently in France, where L'Arche started in 1964. Delegates from all 35 countries were invited, they visited other L'Arche communities in France, and then met for a huge celebration in Paris on September 27th. There were 7,000 people who walked the streets of Paris to Place de la République for a party as only L'Arche can organize.

Many people offered their thanks to Jean Vanier, the founder of L'Arche. In an interview with KTO Catholic Television in the midst of the Paris celebrations, Jean was quick to deflect the praise: "It's not me - this is God's work", says Jean. "It is this mystery of fragile people who attract others with their simplicity, their affectivity. We live an experience of being transformed by them. ... It is a healing relationship where I discover my vulnerability, my weaknesses. Instead of being someone who has to be strong, I discover I have the right to simply be who I am."

After 50 years, in the midst of the Jubilee celebrations, one word came to mind for Jean: abundance. "When God desires something, it is accomplished with abundance. When God gives life, it is given in abundance" he said, referring to the abundance of celebration happening on the streets of Paris. As for the future of L'Arche, "There is a danger of wanting too many assurances. We have the conviction that we are loved - we must let ourselves be drawn to this mystery, with much trust. We must become men and women of compassion. But this path is never easy ... there are no assurances, but there is hope, and faith."

"The story of L'Arche is a progressive story, of living with people who are weak and who lead us to God There have been difficult times, lack of help, tensions but that's life! We are able to go through the difficult times because, somewhere, we know that this is the work of God."

Remembering a Founding Member & Friend

O ne of the founding members of the L'Arche Winnipeg community and our eldest member, Marjorie London, passed away on October 1st, 2014. Marge was 82 years old.

Marge was one of the first people welcomed to L'Arche, arriving in December 1973. She loved living with Sister Marie Paradis, the founding director and her good friend.

Marge dreamed of living on her own and was able to do so for many years. "Some of Marge's happiest years were the ones spent in her apartment on Roanoke street" recalls her good friend and advocate Barbara Pantel, who was a constant presence at her bedside in her final days. In her eulogy at the memorial service, Barbara recalled how Marge was happy in retirement - playing her music (especially Anne Murray), reading the paper, and watching sports on TV. She liked to come to L'Arche events, and to help out at the office. Marge had birds for company in her apartment. Her first bird was Duffy. Then she was given two finches, whom she named Jack and Jill.

Marge spent her last years at Park Manor Personal Care Home, a place familiar to her as her parents had both lived there at one time as well.

"I thought no one could take the place of her birds when they were

gone," remembers Barbara, "but to my surprise she found a little stuffed dog on a shopping trip who became her constant companion. She named it Patrick. It was important for Marge to have something to love and nurture, and she found that in Patrick."

"Family meant a lot to Marge, and she had close friends who often visited her. She enjoyed music therapy with Faith, who kept up her friendship with Marge. She looked forward to her Tuesday night visits from Dorothy and Sister Pauline to play cards - and how she loved to win and beat Sr. Pauline!"

Marge was the same age as her friend Sister Marie, whom she last saw at the 35th anniversary (above photo). They both passed away this year - Sr. Marie four months earlier, in May. Sr. Marie was there in 1973 to welcome Marge into her L'Arche home. I trust that she was there again to help welcome Marge into her new, eternal home with God.

Delegates at the L'Arche Western Canada's Regional Assembly in Edmonton, October 24 to 26, affirmed Linda Filjak as our new Vice Regional Leader for the next four years. Undeserved Grace

"As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which you were called in the one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom: and with gratitude in hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." Colossians 3 12-15, 17.

he above passage from Paul's letter to the Colossians is a good description of L'Arche. As I reflect on the fifty years of L'Arche's existence and my own involvement of forty vears. Richard Rohr's term "undeserved grace" immediately comes to mind. I believe that all the members of L'Arche have been chosen by God to live in community and to love one another. And what a gift it has been!! Through L'Arche I have discovered the Spirit of God's presence in the world, with community members, indeed with all of humanity and all of creation. I have been healed and nurtured.

It will forever remain a mystery to me why I have been chosen to be a part of L'Arche and so experience God's grace. I am all too human and no more worthy of this grace than anyone else. But I am very grateful for the call to be in relationships with people with a developmental disability.

As Thomas Merton says Christ is found with all those people for whom there is no room in the inn, all those who are rejected by the powerful. Our members with a disability, despite all the rejection they have received, love and accept us we are. They do not care about all those things that divide humanity, politics, religion, race, theology, sexual orientation, and all other ideologies. Like God's spirit, they love us as we are and readily forgive us when we mess things up. I have learned a lot from them about matters of the heart, forgiveness, and of God's love for each one of us.

In the passage from Paul's letter he makes three references to being thankful. As we reflect on our own experience of L'Arche and prepare for Advent let us be thankful for Emmanuel - God is with us.
