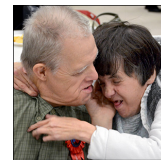

My Special Friend, Clive

Clive and I first met in May 1974 at Riding Mountain National Park here in Manitoba. I had arrived by plane from Ontario to work as a summer assistant at L'Arche Winnipeg. I was met at the Winnipeg airport by Sister Marie Paradis and whisked immediately off to Riding Mountain, where the L'Arche community members were camping for the May long weekend. I was twenty-two years old at the time and Clive was just twenty years old, having moved to "Rosseau Court" from an institution in Portage La Prairie five months previously.

Clive has Down's syndrome and is also unable to hear or speak. But that has never stopped him from living as full a life as possible. The weekend we met, I remember watching him from a far, intrigued by the manner in which he was able to adequately communicate. As well as being able to make his needs known through his self-developed sign language, I very quickly observed him to have a keen sense of humour.

With a smile on his face and a twinkle in his eye, he appeared quite skilled as a mime artist, often entertaining us with his antics.

“Art from the Heart” Show at L’Arche Tova Café

L’Arche Winnipeg’s 2nd annual art show, “Art from the Heart”, was held in the L’Arche Tova Café on August 20th. Over sixty pieces of art were created by 15 people with an intellectual disability, members of the L’Arche Winnipeg community.

The art pieces were created over a period of two months with the help of instructor **Tammy Vogel**, who led six Sunday afternoon workshops for the budding artists. Under Tammy’s guidance, the workshop participants were able to explore various mediums and learn new techniques. The result was a variety of artistic expression with the creation of cards, picture frames, coasters, acrylic on rocks, and other mediums.

There was a steady flow of people between 11:00 am and 5:00 pm, coming to the Café to admire the artists’ creations which were grouped under such headings as “Things I Like”, “Makes Me Happy”, “I Feel Good About”, or “Free to Create”. The art show coincided with the weekly Transcona Biz Market Garden in Centennial Square, just 3 doors west of the Café, so many people were able to take in both events.

The sale of the art pieces totaled \$432.00, and that money is being sent to **L’Arche International Solidarity Fund** – helping L’Arche communities in poorer countries where little, or no government funding is available to support people with intellectual disabilities.

L'Ainé House Gifted With New Garage

The first L'Arche home in Winnipeg, which opened 42 years ago, has a new and impressive addition: a large garage which was built with the help and generosity of many people, for about a third of the cost of a new garage.

Ron Delaquis, whose sister Nicole lived at L'Ainé for many years, spearheaded the project. Phil and Ron Delaquis demolished the old garage with the assistance of Tri Core, Phil's employer, who let him use their backhoe, midhoe and gravel truck without charge. Bill Hicks of Battlefield Equipment gave the free rental of a container to store the contents of the garage during construction and Greg of Crane Towing delivered it at no charge.

Peter Toews of P.V. Construction built the concrete garage pad at a discount-

ed rate. Dawn Fraser and Aaron Anderson of LaFarge donated the concrete for the pad. Olympic Building Centre (Blaine Reimer) donated the complete garage package.

Rental Experts gave the use of a Zumbroom to erect the new garage, including walls, trusses, and roofing.

The volunteer construction crew included Etienne Grenier, Denis Hebert, Gerald Mabon, Bob Hebert, Remi Grenier, Philip Delaquis, and Ron Delaquis.

We are very grateful for all the assistance we have received. We particularly want to thank Ron and Philip Delaquis for all the work they have done including finding many of the donated items and services and a dedicated construction crew.

It was wonderful to see the connection that Clive enjoyed with his parents.

I left the L'Arche Winnipeg community in late August 1974 to return to Ontario and my university studies. Upon completion of my studies in May 1975, I found myself travelling back to Winnipeg to spend another year living and working with the L'Arche Winnipeg community. It was during this year that the special friendship developing between Clive and myself was solidified. When I left the L'Arche community a year later, to pursue a teaching career in Winnipeg, I knew that Clive and I would be friends for a very long time.

Forty years later, we are still friends. Clive has become an integral part of our family and we enjoy his company as much as I imagine he enjoys ours. When my husband and I were married in 1995, we invited Clive to sit at the head picnic table with us in Bird's Hill Park. Since then, Clive has come to spend several days and nights in our home at least four times a year - Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter as well as summer holidays. During those times we have visited pumpkin farms, sat on Santa's knee together, participated in many Easter egg hunts and visited a local fire station. We have also enjoyed the family tradition of travelling to Lockport every fall to relish a foot long hotdog at Skinner's.

Clive, my husband, Roger and I have attended many animated and action films together at local movie theatres. While Clive appears to enjoy the action of the movies, I enjoy watching Clive with his enormous bucket of popcorn and favourite soft drink, miming the story of the movie.

Throughout the years, Clive has assisted us in acting as a "walk marshal" at the annual L'Arche Winnipeg fundraiser walk-a-thon, donning a fluorescent patrol vest and directing pedestri-

an traffic across a street. But he is really in his element when he relaxes in his favourite black leather recliner chair in our living room - a chair that has lovingly been dubbed as "Clive's Chair". He has his own bedroom at our house, which we have adorned with a few toy and stuffed pigs. His love of pigs developed during his years of living at the L'Arche farm in Lorette.

Clive often comes to Roger's family reunion celebrations with us at Christmas and in the summer when we travel to Roger's brother's cottage near Lac du Bonnet. If he is not able to join us, for one reason or another, Roger's family always asks about him, concerned about his welfare and the fact that he is missing out on a family event.

I have heard it said that I am a "L'Arche Winnipeg volunteer". But what is a volunteer? Clive has truly become a member of our family, much like an adopted brother. I cannot begin to imagine my life without him. He has blessed me in more ways than I am able to express. He is truly a gift to me, my family and all who encounter his presence.
