Passage of L'Arche Founder Jean Vanier



Hazel, from L'Arche Winnipeg, had the pleasure of going to visit her good friend Jean at his home in Trosly, France, in 2012

Jean Vanier, founder of L'Arche and co-founder of Faith and Light, passed away on May 7th at age 90. He will be missed by a countless number of people across the world who have been influenced by him, his words, his spirituality.

The following comments are excerpts from a memorial letter by Stephan Posner and Stacy Cates-Carney, International Leader and Vice-International Leader of L'Arche.

J ean was tall! First of all, he was almost 2 meters tall: many of us have in mind his long silhouette so often bent towards the person he was speaking with, as if to say he was aware of the need to establish an immediate closeness with the one who had come to meet him.

In his way of leaning in, looking, listening and speaking to those who met him, Jean's greatness lay in how he could bring into the open, part of the light buried deep in so many people. He bore witness to something quite unexpected and unforeseen: from the heart of a wounded man or woman, (and which of us is not wounded?), from where we least expect it, within our poverty, he would see a glimmer of light, a ray of joy, which reveals the sheer humanity of a human being. What was great about Jean was that he turned upside down our normal way of seeing, and he saw greatness in the very fragility of our human condition.

"You are more beautiful than you dare to believe:" Jean really loved repeating this phrase. And yet he cannot be separated either from "the right to be ugly" which he also enjoyed pointing out. He would speak to us about the "human dough" which we are made of, this indivisible mix of light and shade; we sometimes feel stuck in this dough, but it is also our most fertile soil.

The Café will be closed for one week in August for staff holidays, from Sunday, August 18th until Monday August 26th, and will re-open on Tuesday, August 27th.


Remembering Jean Vanier

After Jean Vanier passed away in early May, I was in a discussion with two members of L'Arche. We asked each other, *"Where would we be if he had not come into our lives?"* We all agreed that our lives would be poorer without his influence. We also asked ourselves, *"What did he teach us?"*

First, he taught us to recognize the gifts of people with developmental disabilities. They are people of welcome, forgiveness and celebration. Above all else, in their vulnerability they can lead us to God, to the Spirit of God within each one of us. They know what is most important in life: our relationships with other people. They are not afraid to express their love and need for others. Jean also realized that we need to live in relationships with other people if we are to grow and become more ourselves, more human. We all need community. That is why Jean Vanier called L'Arche a school of the heart.

Another thing I learned from Jean Vanier is to not be afraid to ask for help. He may have learned it from L'Arche members with a developmental disability who, in their vulnerability, know that they need help every day. Jean Vanier was always asking people for help. At his Gimli retreat in 1973, he said to Sister Marie Paradis "I think you should start a L'Arche community in Winnipeg." So she did. He also asked the retreatants for a home to start the community. Sister Cecile Fortier of the Oblates Sisters, led by the Holy Spirit, offered their small convent in Transcona to Jean Vanier to start a L'Arche community - and 46

years later we are still using that home. In my experience at L'Arche, most people like to help others. It gives their lives meaning and the human connection we all need. So let us not be afraid to ask each other for help.

After Jean passed away I heard Sue Mosteller, a good friend of Sister Marie Paradis and Jean, speak of his legacy on CBC Radio. His legacy for her was that he had taught her, and many of us, to trust ourselves - to listen to the Spirit of God within us and follow that voice, that conscience. That trust allowed her to take on the roles of Community Leader of L'Arche Daybreak, and as International Coordinator of L'Arche. That trust in our inner voice is part of the culture of L'Arche. I believe that over the 44 years I have been connected to L'Arche, I have learned to trust myself, and my gifts of discernment. That doesn't mean I don't make mistakes, usually because I haven't trusted that inner voice. And while discernment or trusting the inner voice is part of our culture, at L'Arche Winnipeg we certainly need to encourage each other to discover and trust the Spirit of God within us, trust that inner voice.

Thank you Jean Vanier for all the gifts you have given us. May we all carry on your legacy.

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Often, through his presence and his gaze, we have discovered hospitality without limit: the feeling of being seen, seen for the dough that we are, known, and amazed to be deeply loved: "you are more beautiful than you dare to believe."

He was able to look at us in this way, because he knew that he too was made of the same dough, capable of light and shade; it is beyond doubt, that, in spite of our own 'heaviness', we have been continually welcomed as we are, through Jean's gift of making each person feel uniquely special.

In relation to his role at L'Arche, Jean wrote the following: "Finally," he said, "it is often said that I am the founder, but I am simply the first to arrive."

On June 20, 2019, **Diane Truderung** received the Paul Harris Fellow Recognition. This award was created in memory of Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary to show appreciation for contributions exemplifying the highest ideal in Rotary in placing "service above self". Diane has been a proud member of Transcona Rotary since 2012.

Diane is the Director of Fund Development and Communications for L'Arche Winnipeg. She was a member of the L'Arche Strategy Committee that first explored the possibility of starting a social enterprise, and in 2012 the L'Arche Tova Café became a reality. Diane previously worked for the Canadian Diabetes Association (now Diabetes Canada) and as Executive Director of the Transcona Biz Zone.

Her volunteer work includes serving as Past President of the Transcona Museum, as a member of the City of Winnipeg Library Advisory Committee (NE Area) and as a volunteer with the Transcona Hi Neighbour Festival. As well, Diane was co-chair of the TMAC
