A Light in the World - Remembering Albert

I was one of a handful of people who welcomed Albert Vinet to L'Arche Winnipeg's farm in Lorette on May 1, 1975 and I have had the privilege of knowing Albert for over 44 years. It was a special place, where the Spirit of God was very present. Many visitors to the farm commented on how welcoming a place it was and certainly Albert's amazing gifts of welcome, loving kindness, and forgiveness were an important part of that beginning.

Evelyn, a member of L'Arche Winnipeg, has said that many of our members with a disability are mystics. They intuitively understand that God loves them as they are and that God calls us to be kind and compassionate to one another. Because of their vulnerability they know that friendships, relationships are the most important thing in our lives. We need each other. Albert was certainly a mystic. Not only did he recognize God's presence in his life but he reflected upon what he was living and what people he respected and loved said to him. More than any person I can think of, he was a man of God; a follower of Jesus. He valued every person he ever met.

He has had many companions on his journey. The members of L'Arche Winnipeg loved him, and he certainly loved us. He attracted kind, humble, and loving people like himself as close friends.

I was looking through some pictures from the farm days. About five months after he arrived, Albert was chosen to go on a Faith & Light pilgrimage to Rome with Sister Cecile, the mother superior of the small convent in Lorette. I have never met anyone more loving and compassionate than Cecile. Her smile would instantly warm your heart.

In the picture Cecile is holding on tightly to Albert's arm as they climb the steps of St. Joseph's Oratory in Montreal. His face reflects a certain pride in being able to help this lovely lady. Spending a week with her must have really helped heal the pain he felt from being in the institution in Portage.

On the farm, Albert talked a lot about how big and strong Bob Nolan was. And Albert would say with great respect that Bob was a policeman. When the farm was closed down, Albert moved to the city and ended up living with Bob and Shirley. I believe with them he had the security he needed to really heal from his past and become the man we all came to know and love.

On May 7th this year, the day after Jean Vanier died, I received a phone call from Carol Saunders, a Winnipeg Free Press reporter. She wanted to do a story that day about how Jean Vanier had influenced the life of a person with a disability at L'Arche Winnipeg. The first person to come to mind was Albert. When Carol and Ruth, the photographer, came he warmly welcomed them and they quickly connected with him. So much so that they didn't was looming. I urge you taken in 1992.

Jean Vanier, Liberator

I was a 23 year-old journalist when I first met Jean Vanier at a press conference in 1973. I must admit that I was guite conflicted at that first encounter. I was immediately drawn to him, to his words, but at the same time I was very uncomfortable in his presence: I wanted to be there, and I didn't want to be there. It was like being drawn to a light, but not ready to have that light shine in certain areas of my life. Little did I know then, that the ensuing week-long Gimli retreat with Jean would be the catalyst that would eventually completely change the course of my life.

Since then, I've had the pleasure of being with Jean on a number of occasions - during his visits to Winnipeg, or at international gatherings of both L'Arche and Faith & Light where I was a delegate, or was brought in as a photographer, or as a translator.

Jean's passing in May stirred up many memories of experiencing, and witnessing, how God's love flowed through Jean. One word stands out to describe what Jean Vanier has meant to me: liberator.

Because of Jean, thousands of people with intellectual disabilities across the world have been "liberated" from institutions and found a home in L'Arche, or found a place of belonging in a Faith & Light community. There are aspects of Jean's legacy that are measurable: we can count the number of communities founded, the number of books he's written, etc. But there is one aspect of his legacy that is immeasurable, and that is the countless number of people across the world who have been "liberated" by him, that is to say whose lives have been touched and transformed, by his words, by his spirituality, by the example of his caring for others.

An encounter with Jean Vanier. either in person or through his writings, most often meant being taken on a journey - an inner journey, a journey "home". In that sense too, Jean was a liberator. He could free us from our fears and doubts about ourselves with his words "you are more beautiful than you dare to believe". Jean could bring us deeper still, revealing to us, or reminding us, of our most fundamental identity which is not the identity, the image, that we often forge for ourselves based on our work, our accomplishments, or what other people say about us. Jean could see through that, he could cut through the protective layers we put around our heart, and reveal to us our most fundamental identity: you are a beloved son, a beloved daughter of God. This is the "home" to which Jean could bring us.

From that place, Jean could then liberate in us, call forth in us - I want to say "springs of living water" - that is to say our capacity to love, and to put that love into action, on whichever path our live takes us on.

Jean was clear and transparent about his own journey, in regards to the source of his inner freedom, the source of the love that guided him. He left what could have been a successful career in the navy, and later as a university professor, "*in order to work for peace, to follow Jesus*".

Jean's "immeasurable" legacy is found in the hearts of so many people who have re-connected with God and with their own heart, and found therein the freedom to love.
